
"It's called team, and one of the ingredients of team is sacrifice. Gotta



A man of uncompromising character, Joel was part of a class of men known for both their courage and charitable nature. Most of the class would serve in World War II, 26 of whom would be killed in action. On their return from combat, the brotherhood would stay together, giving back to Clemson every step of the way. Their gift back to Clemson was the Natural Heritage Garden, located on campus in the South Carolina Botanical Gardens, and also included the '39 Bell Tower in the Carillon Gardens as well as the Class of 1939 Award for Excellence. Mary has created The Joel Hallman Radcliffe '39 and Mary Radcliffe Welch HA '39 Heritage Gardens Endowment to provide unrestricted support for the preservation, maintenance and improvement of the Gardens in perpetuity. Mary's gift will help sustain these gardens, forever memorializing her father and his classmates in the year-round beauty of the flowers, shrubbery and garden paths. The Class of '39 Heritage Garden offers us an important lesson about Clemson.
