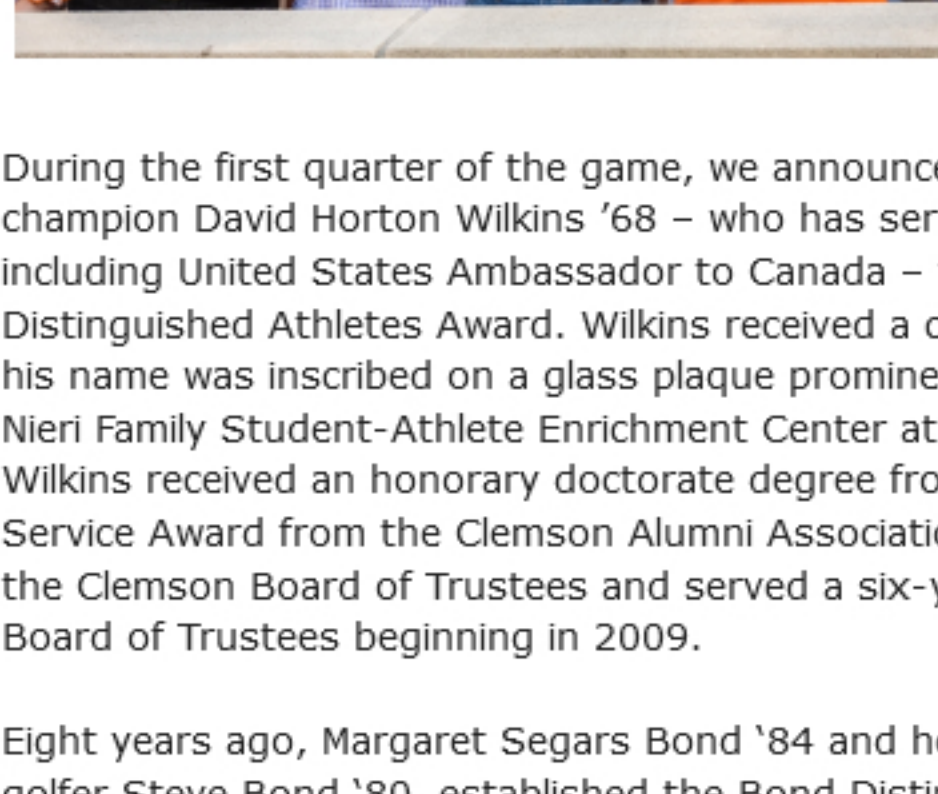


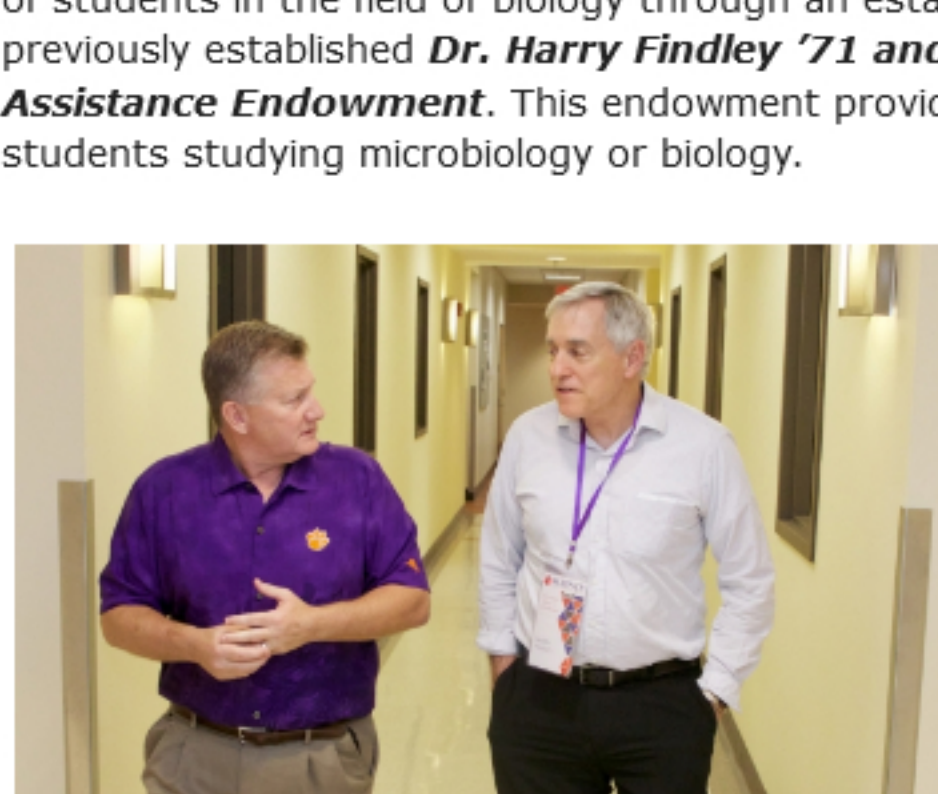
Greetings, fellow Tigers!

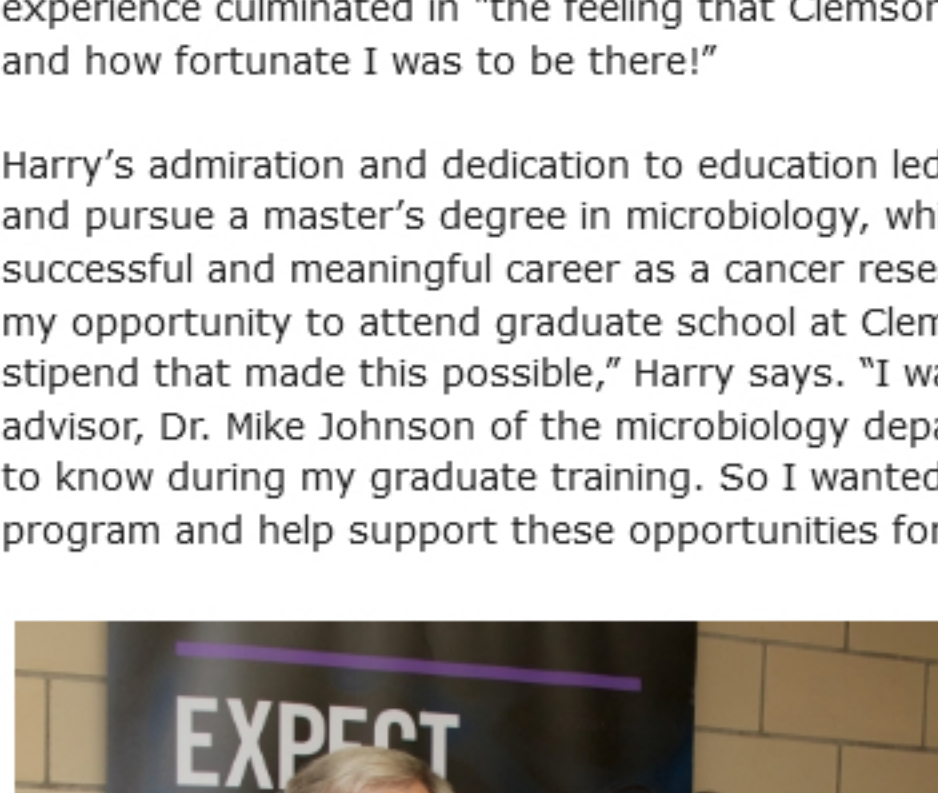


During the first quarter of the game, we announced former Clemson tennis champion David Horton Wilkins '68 – who has served many political appointments, including United States Ambassador to Canada – was selected for the 2021 Bond Distinguished Athletes Award. Wilkins received a custom-designed gold ring and his name was inscribed on a glass plaque prominently displayed by the elevator in Nieri Family Student-Athlete Enrichment Center at Memorial Stadium. In 2003, Wilkins received an honorary doctorate degree from Clemson and the Distinguished Service Award from the Clemson Alumni Association. In 2007, he was named to the Clemson Board of Trustees and served a six-year term and as Chair of the Board of Trustees beginning in 2009.

Eight years ago, Margaret Segars Bond '84 and her late husband, former Clemson golfer Steve Bond '80, established the Bond Distinguished Athletes Award. The award honors former Clemson athletes who exemplify great character, leadership, citizenship and service while supporting Clemson Academics and Athletics and significantly improving the communities in which they live and serve. It takes a strong constitution to lead a life devoted to service and sacrifice. One must be dedicated to purposes greater than oneself, and Harry Findley '71 exemplifies that dedication. From serving in the Armed Forces to teaching, he has given back with this time, talent and treasure. Harry has always been committed to paying it forward. In that spirit, he has ensured the education of students in the field of biology through an estate gift that supports the previously established **Dr. Harry Findley '71 and Catherine T. Findley Student Assistance Endowment**. This endowment provides support for graduate students studying microbiology or biology.

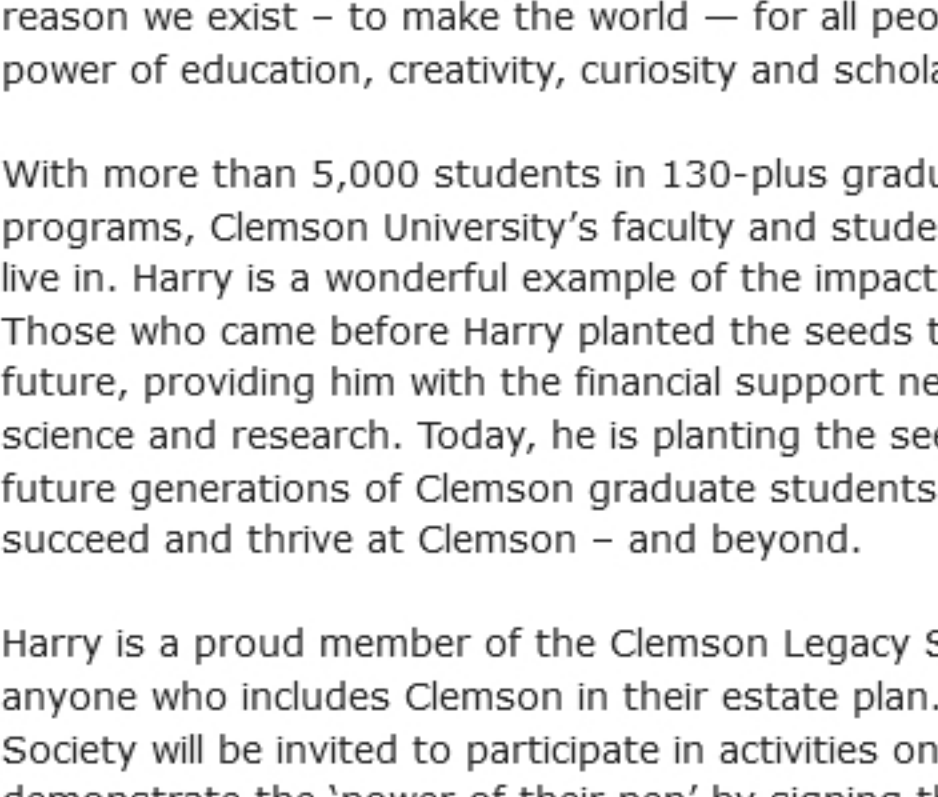


From an early age, Harry's life was influenced by service. The son of a career Air Force officer, Harry was born at Donaldson Air Force Base in Greenville, South Carolina. His father's career required frequent moves, and the Findley family was transferred often – from locations like Arlington, Virginia to England. Upon his father's retirement, Harry completed high school at T.L. Hanna High School in Anderson, South Carolina and endeavored to attend an out-of-state university. After his freshman year out of state, Harry returned home to work part-time and attend night school. He was drafted into the U.S. Army and completed Basic Training and Airborne School at Fort Benning in Georgia. Harry served a 12-month tour in Vietnam with the 173rd Airborne Brigade from 1966-1967. He was called home after that tour to serve as an advanced infantry instructor at Fort McClellan, Alabama, preparing the brave young men for the difficult times they would face ahead.

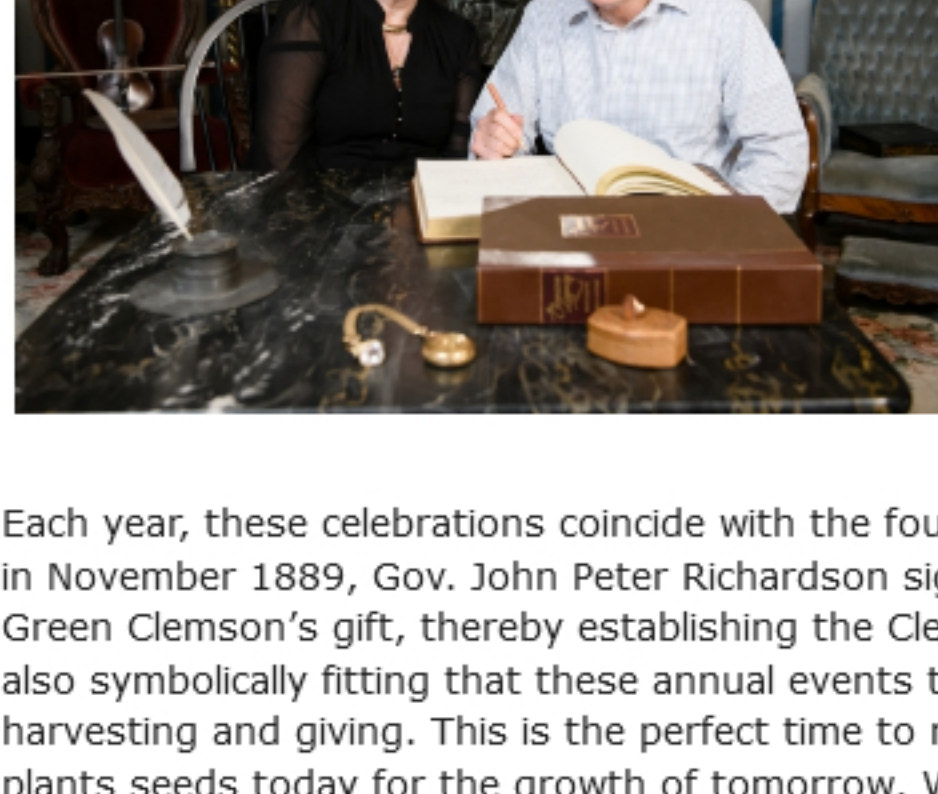
After earning an honorable discharge, Harry entered Clemson University in the summer of 1968 with the aid of the G.I. Bill – beginning his career in science.

Harry recalls fond memories of days on Lake Hartwell, in the Experimental Forest, and time spent preparing for Homecoming weekend and football games. His experience culminated in "the feeling that Clemson was a wonderful place to be, and how fortunate I was to be there!"

Harry's admiration and dedication to education led him to continue his education and pursue a master's degree in microbiology, which would help him launch a successful and meaningful career as a cancer researcher. "I was very appreciative of my opportunity to attend graduate school at Clemson, and for the graduate stipend that made this possible," Harry says. "I was also inspired by my graduate advisor, Dr. Mike Johnson of the microbiology department, and other faculty I came to know during my graduate training. So I wanted to give back to the graduate program and help support these opportunities for future students."



Today, Clemson remains committed to our graduate students and research. The College of Science is pursuing excellence in scientific discovery, learning and engagement that is both locally relevant and globally impactful. Researchers within the College of Science are designing new drugs, charting new galaxies and creating new gadgets. And many of these researchers are graduate students. Gifts supporting our graduate students, like the gift from Harry, is a gift of discovery – a gift that will help change the world.

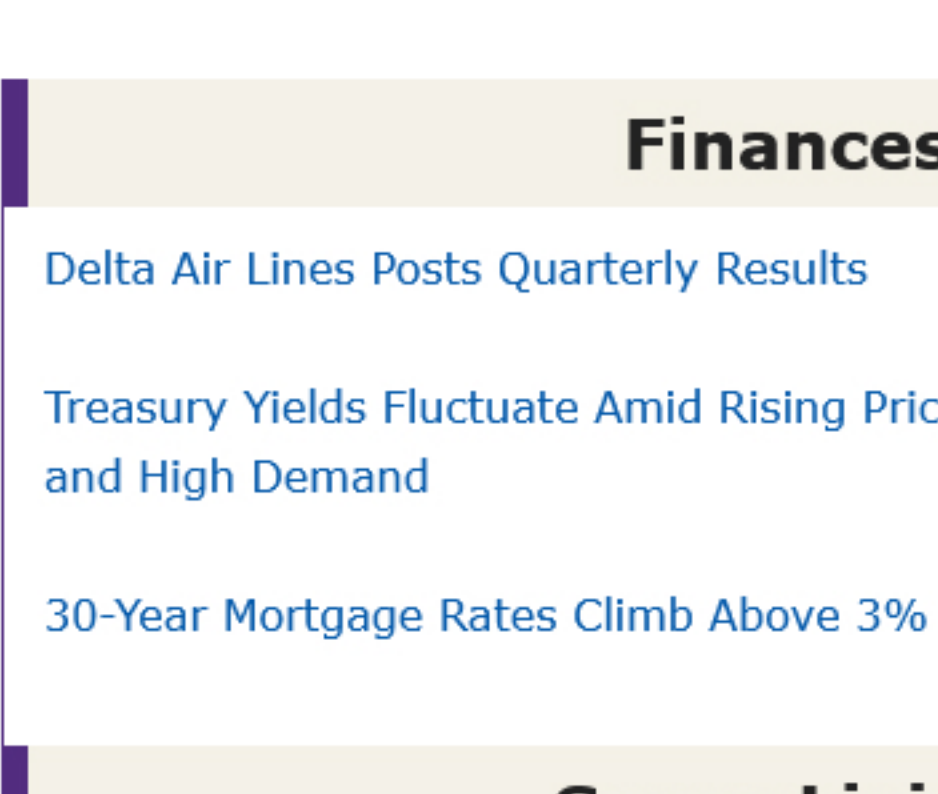

This is a posthumous honor for those who bequeath \$1 million or more to perpetuate the highest ideals of Clemson University to fulfill our land-grant mission of outstanding teaching, research and public service. We are looking forward to celebrating the dedication of all of our Legacy Society members and their plans to leave a personal mark on the future of Clemson University.

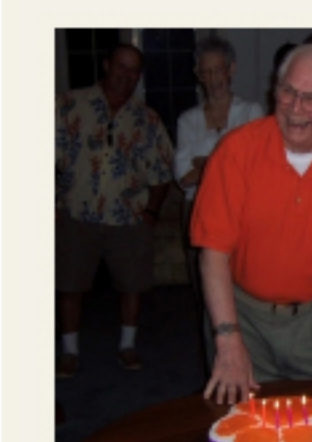

[IRA and 401\(k\) Designated Beneficiary Options](#)

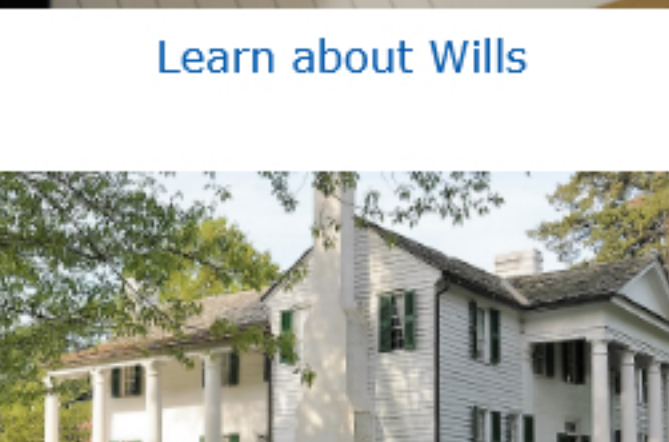

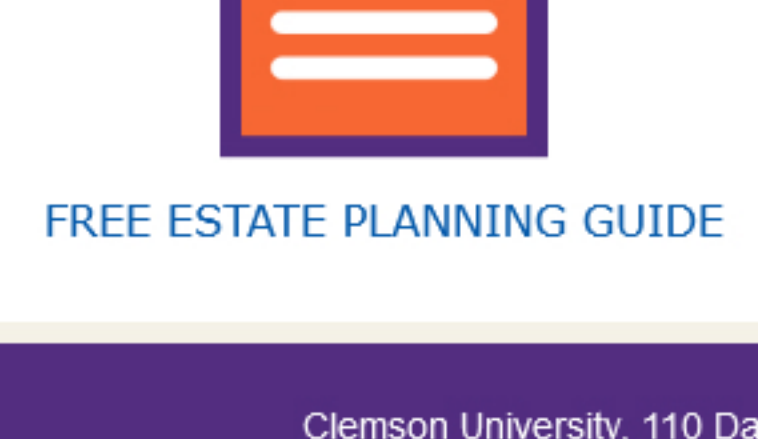

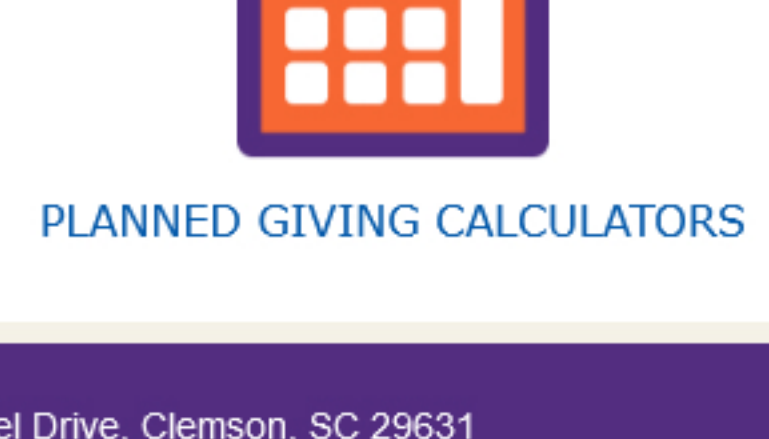
A Ring of History

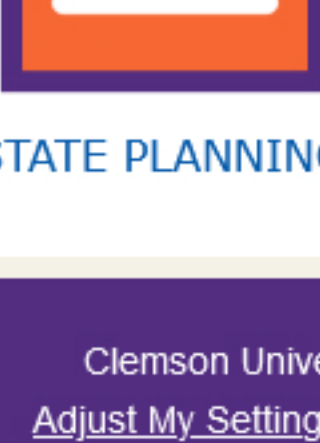

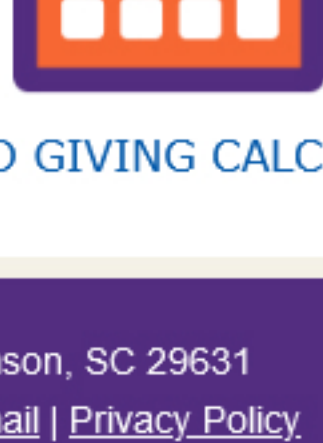
